The Rhodes Scholarship is the highest academic distinction open to students of the English-speaking world. To those who are fitted to take advantage of it, quite exceptional opportunities are offered. During each of the three years for which it is tenable the scholar is enabled to reside, for terms covering a period of six months, at one of the most ancient and renowned seats of learning in Europe, where, along with students of many other nations, he can enter into the broad stream of that intimate corporate life which exists in a residential college and nowhere else. During the remaining six months of his tenure the Rhodes scholar is at liberty to travel and study in any part of Europe or North America. The scholarship is thus to anyone who, like Cecil Rhodes himself, has the imagination to grasp its full significance, a key by which he may gain access to an newhaustible treasure-house of en-
