Dear Sir,

I regret delay in acknowledging your letter of 31st August, (Ref. F.8/2) in regard to my father, Charles Cooze, at present resident in Pitcairn Island. It has been necessary, however, to communicate with his other sons and daughters.

The consensus of opinion is that it would be dangerous for my father to come, at the age of 96, from the tropical climate of Pitcairn to New Zealand.

None of the family are in a position to take care of him. I am not referring to financial aspects, but in my own case my husband is retired on account of ill-health and I am in receipt of Age Benefit.

I have endeavoured to keep constantly in touch with my father and send him such comforts as are possible under existing communication circumstances, and regret very much that he should be separated from his family. He went, however, of his own free will to Pitcairn some 17 years ago with his youngest son, but the latter has not fulfilled his obligations and is now somewhere in the South Island, leaving his wife and children with
