The singing class, under Mr. Robertson, gave a creditable rendering of "Nancy" (Mitchell), after which the Governor who was in the chair delivered an address.

HIS EXCELLENCY said this was not the first time on which he had met the masters and boys of Prince Alfred College under similar circumstances. (Cheers.) He could not forget too the pleasant afternoon which Lady Victoria and he had recently spent at the college on the occasion of the annual sports, when the competitions were carried out with heartiness and goodwill. He only hoped that he would have an opportunity of repeating that pleasant experience. (Cheers.) Might he also be allowed to allude to their cricket match with St. Peter's College. There might be something about its conclusion which might not be altogether welcome to all present—(laughter)

—but at all events they could look back upon it as a capital well-fought game which reflected credit on both elevens. (Cheers.) He hoped they would regard their sports as a means of recreation and of gaining strength to enable them to more satisfactorily cope with the important work of after life. (Hear, hear.) It had been his pleasure to visit many schools in South Australia, and whether they were situated in Kangaroo Island and localities perhaps more remote, or whether they were in the heart of the city, he always felt that the pupils had one common source of pride in the thought that they not only belonged to so fine a country but also to the great British Empire. (Cheers.) This year through the celebration of her Majesty's long reign they had had prominently brought under their notice the vastness of the Empire over which she so worthily reigned. That Empire covered many forms of government, many different races, and many climes, but still they were one, and their unity was symbolised by her Majesty the Queen. He hoped therefore the boys of South Australia would bear in mind, however humble the duty they might be called upon in future to perform, that if they did it well they would be serving the interests not only of the colony but of the great British Empire. (Cheers.) To be a member of the British Empire carried with it many privileges. Any Australian travelling in far-off countries could get his grievances remedied or his journeyings facilitated by appealing to the British consuls and ambassadors — officials not paid by the Australian Governments, but appointed to assist and protect all British subjects. (Cheers.) Might he mention a matter which had lately been given some prominence — the increase in the number of children who had to be dealt with by magistrates and sent to the reformatory. This was a matter which had engrossed the attention of many, and perhaps no one had given it more anxious and earnest consideration than the late Mr. McPherson, whose death the colony so much lamented. Many causes had been assigned for this unfortunate state of affairs, and it had been said that gambling and betting had a good deal to do with it. Now, he did not think boys took to betting because they really liked it, but because they thought it appeared manly and fine. That was a miserable excuse. (Hear, hear.) He hoped the boys of Prince Alfred College and the other schools of the colony would set themselves against any tendency towards gambling, for if they did so he felt sure they would wield a wide and beneficial influence. (Hear, hear.) Had they allowed the miserable motive of making a few shillings in this way to enter into their sports competitions he felt sure they could not have been carried out with such great success. (Hear, hear.) He congratulated the headmaster on his report, and the scholars and teaching staff generally on the success which had attended the labors of the year. (Cheers.)

The distribution of prizes followed, and during the afternoon members of the gymnasium class under Mr. H. Leschen gave an exhibition of club swinging and juggling, executing a series of intricate movements very effectively. Recitations were delivered in German by Masters H. M. Johnson and A. B. Lloyd, and English verse translations of them were given by Masters C. R. Churchward and W. E. Woods. There were five competitors for the prizes for English recitation. Master J. R. Cohen recited "The African chief," Master C. M. D. Sparrow "Smiting the rock," Master F. Harris "Modern logic," and Masters L. D. Grewar and H. Noltenius the dialogue between Cassius and Brutus from "Julius Cæsar." The Governor, who was the judge, placed Sparrow first and Grewar second. The singing-class gave "Men of Harlech," "Go in Princes," and "A boating song;" the second and third forms recited "When we are men;" Masters C. H. Osborne and G. H. Randell played a pianoforte duet, "Le lac" (Leon D'Orville); and Mr. W. B. Chinner rendered selections on the organ.

On the motion of the Rev. J. BERRY, seconded by Mr. JAMES MARSHALL, a vote of thanks was accorded the Governor for presiding.
