**THE MUSIC OF TO-DAY.**

**Mr. William Silver's Impressions.**

London is still the hub of the universe, and not even a terrible world war or a colossal coal strike could undermine her stability and progress. Such is Mr. William Silver's verdict after a year's trip to the old country, from which he returned last Friday. Mr. Silver has benefited, both mentally and physically, from the holiday visit; he looks well, and has enjoyed also the spiritual refreshment that comes from association with good music. Our popular pianist has crowded a wide experience into the months of concert-going in London, New York, and Leipzig, and heard nearly everybody of note in those three musical centres. London, by virtue of its art, and New York through the influence of the "almighty dollar," are now the two musical zones of the world. Germany, which had achieved such distinction, has lost her prestige since the war. With memories of his student days, the traveller went to Leipzig, intending to put in three months in that erstwhile home of musicians, but the demoralizing effect of the war, as evidenced in riots and general industrial unrest, had created such an atmosphere of apprehension and calamity, that it was impossible to concentrate upon music. During the 11 days' visit, four operas were heard and none of them first-rate; the celebrated Gouand Haus Orchestra did not come up to the London Philharmonic. But the English concerts fulfilled all anticipations. There were hundreds of them, many of exceptional merit, and a number of second-rate ones, too. "The greatest

artists flock to London," remarked Mr. Silver on Wednesday, "and so the musician can hear them all in turn. Sir Henry Wood's Orchestra is responsible for wonderful concerts at Queen's Hall, and I have a tremendous admiration for that great conductor, who—night after night—presents such excellent programmes, which embrace ancient and modern compositions, and are so comprehensive. Of all the conductors whom I heard, the finest, to my mind, was Albert Coates, of the London Philharmonic, which is a tribute to the British school. Richard Strauss (the composer) was another great artist. But in the realms of the pianists, there stands out Cortot, who is an illustration of the saying, "For a musician go to Germany, but for an artist go to Paris," and the artistry of all Cortot's work is a delight. I had a chat with him after one of his recitals, and he told me that in his present three years' world tour he hoped to include Australia. Busoni was another highly gifted pianist, but he did not appeal to me as Cortot did. I heard Moserwitsch again, and he appealed to me in London as he failed to do in Australia. As a matter of fact, he was tired out when he visited our country in 1920, and when he first got back to London he was very "off," but gradually achieved a status that surpassed any performance that I heard in Adelaide. Frederic Lamond afforded some happy hours; and Moritz Rosenthal was a musical giant, but he dealt too much in antiques to my mind. He was giving seven historic recitals when I heard him. A new pianist, who was making headway in London, was Ponishoff, a Persian, and he deserved that success.

—America's Pros and Cons.—

In the vocalists' world I have happy recollections of Chaliapine (continued Mr. Silver), who is Russia's greatest bass singer. He gave a performance in the Albert Hall in aid of the Russian relief fund, which was crowded with an audience comprising all nationalities, and showed the foreign element that has taken refuge in London. On the same programme was Lauri Kennedy, and his accompaniment was played by Dorothy McBride, Mus. Bac. (his wife). Myra Hess, a popular pianist, played well, but did not strike me as outstanding. Scriabine is an example of "futurist music," and his extraordinary compositions are being launched by Albert Coates's Orchestra with a chorus and a solo piano. Albert Simmons, the violinist, and Salmond, the cellist—two of England's finest musicians—gave a memorable interpretation of the Brahms Concerto. At the moment Lionel Tertis is the best violin player in England. It is the custom nowadays, when modern English compositions are presented, to invite the composer on to the platform, so that the public may also become familiar with the man as well as his work. Delius was thus presented at a concert I attended. Turning to America, which was visited en route for Adelaide, Mr. Silver said he enjoyed four strenuous days in the musical life of New York, where there were some notable artists. Vincent d'Indy, the great French composer, conducts one of the finest orchestras, the Boston Symphony, which is so wonderfully balanced that its work is almost perfect. During that four days three orchestral concerts, two piano recitals, and an opera were heard. One of the recitalists was Ernest Hutchinson, formerly of Melbourne, who has done well. Mr. Silver went round to the artist's room afterwards to congratulate him, and found a couple of hundred people there. Such is the "intimate" custom in New York, which shows a kindly personal feeling for art. Geraldine Farrar—known here through the "movies"—was heard at the

Metropolitan in opera, and her "Santuzza" in "Cavalleria Rusticana" revealed a wonderful singer with a profound insight. There was one pathetic note struck. When entering the Metropolitan Mr. Silver saw a bust of Caruso, and this was a sad reminder that the famous tenor, who had not missed a season for 18 years, would be heard no more. Dissociating New York from its musicians, Mr. Silver had few good words to say for the American people. He considers that their attitude towards British people is an insult. For instance, the vessel was held up for six hours while formalities were indulged in. They included £2 16/ for a passport and a "head tax"—presumably an excuse to rake in more dollars—which cost another £2 10/. The people were so rude as well, and treated the visitors like aliens. As a matter of fact, Mr. Silver said he could not help contrasting the courtesy extended to them at Leipzig. This led to further reminiscences of that city, where rates of exchange were so favourable that the visitor, paying 7/ for an hotel room for a night, would have disbursed £6 12/ at that rate of marks before the war. "But there is no place like England to me," concluded Mr. Silver, "and there are unforgettable memories of delightful trips to the lakes and other famous spots, including Oxford (where I met Merle Robertson, my former pupil, and an Elder scholar, who is doing well, and was just off to Switzerland). There is one thing I want to say badly. My trip taught me, above all, to lastingly appreciate what Henri Verbrughen has done for the musical life of Australia. It would be a terrible calamity if we lost him. "Are you resuming your teaching?" "Yes, I start again when the University reopens."
