PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS.

The senior and junior public examinations will begin on November 15, and will conclude during the first week in December. With one exception entries show an increase over those of last year. The figures are:—Junior public, 1921, 1,124; 1920, 1,149; senior public, 963 and 944; higher public, 236 and 187; junior commercial, 300 and 265; senior commercial, 44 and 38. On the results of the higher public examinations are awarded a number of Government bursaries, each entitling the winner to a complete course in one of the faculties, included amongst the degrees being those of B.E., B.Sc., LL.B., M.B., B.S., B.D.S., Mus. Bac., agricultural science, and associateship diploma of the School of Mines. On the results of the senior commercial examinations are based the four Crewell scholarships for the diploma of commerce, one provided by the Cricket Association, one by the Royal Agricultural Society, and two by the University. Public examinations are held at approved centres throughout the State, from Marree to Mount Gambier, and from Murat Bay to Renmark and Broken Hill. Junior public examinations will this year be held at 43 centres; senior public at 39, junior commercial at 15, and senior commercial at four. The examinations at Adelaide will begin at the Exhibition Building, but when the majority of the entrants have completed their papers the remainder will go to the University.

Mr. Frederic Chapple, C.M.G., was on Wednesday re-elected warden of the Senate of the University of Adelaide, and Mr. T. A. Caterer was re-elected clerk. It was stated that Mr. Caterer's health is improving.

UNIVERSITY OF ADELAIDE.

IMPORTANT ALTERATIONS IN STATUTES.

A meeting of the Senate of the University of Adelaide was held at the Prince of Wales Theatre, at the University, on Wednesday. The chair was occupied by the Warden (Mr. Frederic Chapple, C.M.G.).

The council was elected as follows:—Warden, Mr. F. Chapple, C.M.G.; Clerk, Mr. T. A. Caterer, B.A.; Mr. W. R. Bayly, B.A., B.Sc., the Rev. K. J. F. Bickersteth, M.A., Mr. J. R. Fowler, M.A., Dr. W. T. Hayward, C.M.G., and Professor W. Mitchell (Vice-Chancellor).

Professor Chapman succeeded in carrying a proposal adding to the statutes as suggested by the council, additions to the list of professors. The additions included the chairs of professor of geology and mineralogy, jury professor of the English language and literature, and professor of zoology. Professor Chapman said that all the chairs had been filled and the professorial list now numbered 16.

In regard to dress an alteration was made by which a salmon pink hood must be worn for the newly-established degree of dental surgery.

Sir Joseph Verco moved that alterations should be made in the regulations of the degree of doctor of medicine. He pointed out that the new provisions made the writing and acceptance of a thesis compulsory. The new clause gave students a wider selection of subject. The motion was carried.

In regard to the degree of Bachelor of Medicine new regulations were agreed to providing for a six years' course, on the proposition of Sir Joseph Verco.

Sir Douglas Mawson proposed the adoption of altered regulations in regard to the degree of doctor of science, in which provision was made for Bachelors of Engineering to proceed to the Doctor of Science degree. The motion was agreed to.

With reference to the degree of Bachelor of Science, the study of zoology was added to the course, and honours courses were added in zoology and vertebrate anatomy, and morphology.

The course in agriculture for the B.S. degree was also revised.

In regard to dental surgery, regulations were approved which asked students for Bachelor of Dental Surgery to attend at the Department of Dentistry at the Adelaide Hospital, or some other recognised institution. An articulated dental student, if was provided, might be exempted from such attendance.

For the Mus. Bac. degree in music in special circumstances, the provisions for matriculation, it was decided, might be varied in the cases of students who had reached the age of 25 years on entrance. Provision was also made for the diploma of Associate in Music, to be taken by a student as executive or as a teacher. A rearrangement of subjects was made for the Elder Conservatorium.

In regard to public examinations, some amendments were made in the regulations for the junior public and senior public and senior commercial examinations. The mover (Professor Henderson) pointed out that in the other States there were intermediate and leaving certificates examinations. The new Adelaide University regulations provided for the repeal of the primary junior, senior, and higher public examinations. In place of them, new regulations for intermediate and leaving examinations were substituted. The intermediate course would, it was decided, take the place of the junior, the leaving of the senior, and the leaving honours of the higher public examinations. The junior and junior commercial would become the intermediate and leaving commercial examinations. The new provisions would, it was decided, become operative in March, 1923. Meanwhile, present regulations would remain in existence.

winner must spend the two years in the United Kingdom studying engineering. On the winner returning to South Australia within five years from the time of gaining the scholarship, he is entitled to receive a further sum of £70 towards his travelling expenses. The scholarship was founded in January, 1885, and is competed for biennially. As no award was made in 1918 there will be another examination held in June, 1922.

MUSIC SCHOLARSHIPS.

Two scholarships, each tenable for three years, are offered annually in connection with the public examination in music conducted by the Australian Music Examinations Board. One provides for free tuition for the Mus. Bac. degree at the University, and the other for the Diploma of Associate in Music at the Elder Conservatorium. The Mus. Bac. Scholarship has been awarded to Miss B. E. Harvey, of Strathalbyn, and that for the A.M.U.A. course to Miss Doris C. Hunter, of Broken Hill.
