educational activities. There had been a difference of opinion in connection with the commercial examinations at the University. The Chamber of Manufacture had taken the stand that as those examinations had been well patronised, the word commercial, as applied to junior and senior examinations in the colleges and high schools, should not be dropped. Teachers at those institutions would like to see the word dispensed with. The University, in its teachings of economics, had, in the opinion of manufacturers, become to a large extent engaged in propaganda work and had been used as a lever by people holding socialistic views. Similar teachings had led Russia into her present condition and would eventually place any other country in the same plight. With careful management the influence of the chamber must grow, and he trusted that in the years to come its sphere of usefulness would be continually expanding. (Applause.)

ECONOMICS AT THE UNIVERSITY.

From I. GOLOVSKY, A.C.U.A., president of the University Students Commerce Society:—Permit me to utter a protest against the remarks made by the president, Mr. J. W. McGregor, at the annual banquet of the Chamber of Manufacture, held at the Grosvenor, on Monday evening last, wherein he was reported to have said:—"The University, in its teaching of economics, had, in the opinion of manufacturers, become, to a large extent, engaged in propaganda work, and had been used as a lever by people holding socialistic views. Similar teachings had led Russia to her present conditions, and would eventually place any other country in the same plight." Such a sweeping statement, coming from the lips of a man holding the responsible position of the president of the Chamber of Manufacture, should not be permitted to pass unchallenged. If there is any truth in the assertion, the University Council should take immediate action. Such reflections are not going to assist that institution in its progress. I, as a past student, emphatically repudiate even the slightest suggestion that the economics course is a means of inculcating socialistic ideas into the heads of the University students. The study of economics is essentially a study of the conditions surrounding labor, and capital, in which the merits and demerits of such are respectively set out without necessarily approving or condemning either system, but to say that lecturers are instilling socialistic doctrines into the minds of students, borders well nigh on the ridiculous. The comparison of conditions in Russia and Australia is, to say the least, odious. Perhaps Russia's present pitiable plight is the result of lack of the training in which we in South Australia are fortunate enough to receive. I regret the necessity which has caused me to write this letter, but such statements, if not promptly contradicted, may have serious effects on the future of the commerce course at the University. Our motto, "Augeatur civitas negotiando," which translated into English means, "The State advances by its commerce," does not in any way bear the taint of Socialism. I trust that Mr. McGregor, instead of attempting to discourage higher commercial education, will assist the University authorities in the early establishment of a Chair of Commerce, which is the Mecca of all present and past commercial students.

SENIOR ENGLISH.
From "COUNTRY TEACHER":—I would like to call attention to the third question in the Senior Public English test this year. It runs as follows:—"What different forms may the sonnet assume? Compare the structure of Milton's sonnet with that of Keats." According to the introduction of the text book (Jones's), specially emphasized in the University syllabus, Keats's sestet has two rhymes only, viz., ed., ed., ed., but the only sonnet by Keats in the set work has a sestet rhyme of cde, cde. Of what value is such a text book? Further, the second part of the question asks for a comparison of the structure of sonnets of Milton and Keats. In this year's work there are no selections by Milton, and one only by Keats. Again, the introduction affirms that Milton adheres chiefly to the rules of the Italian poets, that is the sestet is cde, cde. I find that in taking four of Milton's sonnets at random the sestet rhymes are (1) cdd, cde; (2) cdd, cde; (3) gdc, eed; (4) cd, cd, cd. It will be interesting to know how the examiner arrived at the question and what answer will win his favour. English is a compulsory subject, and the confusion arising from such questions prevents the candidate from doing himself justice in the rest of the paper.

SOCIALISM AT THE UNIVERSITY.

From A. T. SAUNDERS—It is common knowledge that the Russian Soviet Government, which is 99 per cent. Jewish, has spent and is spending large sums of money in propaganda work, and that Australia is included in the ambit of the Jewish-Russian agitator's activities. Of course the propagandists not only will not own that they are Bolsheviks, but will strenuously deny that they are "white anti-Jew" people or institutions which are foolish enough to admit them. In The London Review of Reviews, 15/9/22, No. 393, pages 318-22, are portraits and names of the Soviet Jews who compose the Russian Government, to which Lloyd George and other British politicians pandered. In Russia, as now in the British Empire, the favourite device was to get smart and talkative Jews into the universities, and so influence and inoculate the young students with the sentiment of Karl Marx and other such Jews.
