Expenditure of £7,514,723 Proposed.

Public Purposes Loan Bill to Raise £3,782,200.

The Lean Estimates laid on the table of the Assembly yesterday show that It is proposed by the Government to spend out of loan money during the current financial year, £7,514,723 on public works, the chief item of which is £2,500,000 for the railway department.
