Dear Altken.

I have received the enclosed letter, which explains itself, from Mr Wallace, the Superintendent of Examinations. The position is that University College is in a state of evacuation and, though I have access to the premises, I understand that "no infringement of the state of evacuation" is permitted. My own calculation machines are at Rothemsted, and I could give the candidate his practical examination here without any difficulties that I can foresee. I am inclined to suggest, if you agree, that the candidate should sit for his written examination in London with other candidates, though presumably not in the Department of Statistics, and should take his practical examination under my supervision here. On hearing from you, I should write to Pearson for his concurrence.

Please let me know quite frankly what you think, as I may not adequately apprehend the difficulties which the superintendent feels as to departing from precedent during war time.
