My dear Teddy,

You will be interested in that your remarks in the New Scientist have been somewhat justified by some data I have recently obtained from Stoy at Cape Town, for Cape Town shows the same thing very clearly, with rather close agreement in phase to Adelaide. I do not know that this means a standing wave beating simultaneously over the whole southern hemisphere, but it does seem to imply that if there is a wave advancing in longitude, it is one that repeats itself in 120° , which is the interval between Adelaide and Cape Town. I am trying Christchurch next. I suppose you do not know any co-operative type in that region?
